Postcards from a Small Town

"The place is a little slow." That sounds like a typical complaint from a young girl. It's nothing new. Back in the summer of 1913, that is exactly what one visiting girl wrote to her friend about Middlefield, in a set of postcards that was recently donated to our historical society. The cards were postmarked in Middlefield and sent to Cleveland. Most show scenes of the village, but one features an unidentified group of people.

The recipient of the cards was Florence Evans, born in Cleveland in 1893.

Her father had been born in Wales and was a Civil War veteran. Florence attended the High School of Commerce, where she appeared in its 1910 yearbook. Her great-niece shared with us that Florence started her own candymaking business from her home on Scranton Ave. She never married and

worked as the office manager at a lumber yard.

Later in life, she moved to what had once been her summer cottage in North Royalton, where she lived with her sister and her family. Florence passed away in 1989 and is buried in North Royalton. Her house remains in the family.




The writer of the postcards was Clara Pfister. While there were Pfisters in Geauga County at the time Clara wrote the cards, it's not clear whether she was visiting them. Clara later mentioned enjoying Chardon, suggesting that she may have had ties to the area.

Clara was born in Cleveland in 1891. Like Florence, she attended the High School of Commerce and appeared in the same yearbook. She was also the Assistant Editor of the 1911 yearbook, a role that foreshadowed her future career as a writer.

After graduating from the former Flora Stone Mather College of Western Reserve University, Clara took a business course and worked in an office before attending Ohio State University, where she studied radio writing and acting. She began her career in little theater in Columbus and later became an apprentice at the Cleveland Play House, where she won an acting award. In 1971, Cleveland State University published a book of Clara's poems, followed by an expanded edition. In 1972, she created Dial-a-Poem, where she answered calls with poems she memorized, as she was losing her sight. Clara also became interested in handwriting

analysis and created a puppet named "Big Mouth." She performed with the sassy puppet, giving handwriting analyses at the Gypsy Cellar (an old Hungarian restaurant on Buckeye Road) and at private parties.





1986, and The Plain Dealer ran an admiring obituary celebrating her many accomplishments. So, how did Clara end up in Middlefield? While we can't say for sure, the Encyclopedia of Cleveland History tells us that the Eastern Ohio Traction Co. (later reorganized as the Cleveland & Eastern Traction Co.) operated an interurban line that ran between Cleveland and Chardon, extending southeast to Middlefield. This may have been how Clara traveled to our town.


Coming Soon: Middlefield Oral Histories
